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Tennessee Scholars Requirements

Tennessee Scholars is a workforce development program designed to communicate to students the requirements for success in post-secondary education and the workforce. The curriculum is based on the existing higher education system in Tennessee which includes all Tennessee Post-secondary institutions. It also fully considers the manufacturing and service industries in Tennessee and the trainable workforce needed for continuing their operations and ensures Tennessee's success in attracting new industry. The Tennessee Scholars curriculum gives students the greatest number of options to pursue academic excellence, to enter post-secondary education, the military, or the workforce. The benefits for graduating as a Tennessee Scholar are: full tuition to any Tennessee College of Applied Technology and scholarships to many two year and four Tennessee post-secondary schools. It guarantees increased job potential, recognition, and rewards. Scholars designation is recognized on job applications in more than twenty states.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATING AS A TENNESSEE SCHOLAR

- 4 English Courses
- 4 Mathematics Courses (Algebra I, Algebra 2, Geometry, and one higher level math). Bridge math will not count toward Tennessee Scholars requirements!!!!!!
- 3 Laboratory Science Courses (Biology and Chemistry are required and one additional lab science, Physics strongly preferred)
- 3 Social Studies
- Personal Finance as required by the State of Tennessee
- Must meet State requirements for health and / or physical education
- 1 Fine Arts
- 2 Foreign Language courses in the same language

Additional Criteria – Choose at least two credits from the following: (These courses can be a combination of two of the following or two in the same category). These additional courses cannot count toward other requirements for Tennessee Scholars.

- Career Technical Education
- Fine arts (Such as music, art, dance, drama, production, etc)
- ❖ AP courses which are not already used for basic requirements
- Dual credit / dual enrollment courses
- International Baccalaureate courses not used for basic requirements
- Online not used for basic requirements

Workforce Development Skills Requirements

• 80 hours of Volunteer Service to the Community (See website for non approved Volunteer

hours).

- Maintain a "C" Average minimum in all Tennessee Scholars courses.
- 95% Attendance Required. (Cannot miss more than 36 total days in 4 years of high school)
- No out-of-school suspensions

Note: Inappropriate email address and use of informal language in resumes won't get you the job.


The increasing prevalence of social media and use of informal language in text and instant messages, especially among the younger generation of job-seekers, has significantly influenced the writing style of their resumes. Do not use abbreviations such as 'tks' instead of 'thanks' and 'u' instead of you, in resumes and introductory letters on a job application. Inappropriate email addresses such as encourages a negative assessment on the part of employers who evaluate the job applicants within the first few minutes of reading their resumes. It is often interpreted by employers that the applicant is not serious about the job and would approach his or her job in a similar manner. Most employers check Facebook accounts of applicants. Keep all of your social media footprints clean and career ready!
